And that's because we're celebrating the birth of the Christian Church. And we see the beginning of the church prophesied by Ezekiel in our Old Testament reading. Speaking on behalf of God said that those dead, dried up bones were the whole house of Israel, who said, "Our bones are dried-up, and our hope is lost; we're indeed cut off." It was the "Son of Man" who spoke to them, so that there might be life in them, and it was only after The Spirit was placed within them, that they came together to live as God had intended...
